Happy New Year!

In the ministry, and in my own life, there are so many things to look forward to in this new year. Off the top of my head, there's new ministry beginnings at Western Oregon University, and new and returning students coming back well-rested. I'm excited to continue the momentum fall term into the new year, with students returning from study abroad, first year students knowing the rhythms of campus life, and generally, the joy and kindness of the Lutheran-Episcopal campus ministry community.

In the campus ministry, we will welcome intern Julia into six months of learning and growth, en route to ordination as a Deacon in the ELCA. In the wild story of my own call to campus ministry, there was a promise that the campus ministry was both *feral* (not under the institutional thumb of the church) and *fallow* (a nice way of saying there was *one* student). It was Julia who was that *one* student for quite some time in the campus ministry.

It is amazing to see how the ministry with students continues to grow around full tables and good food, and the creativity and life of young adults on campus. Such is the blessing of beginnings, where so many things- really good things- happen all at once.

I am reminded of the scripture of Isaiah, "Behold I am doing a new thing- do you not perceive it?" that felt like more of a promise (and frankly trying exercise in trusting God in the very beginning of a fallow and feral campus ministry). Now, on the threshold of the new year, I give thanks for the way-making and the provision God-with-us continues to lead us onward.
